

Norton Juxta Kempsey CE First School – Pupil Premium Overview

In 2011/12 the Government launched its Pupil Premium funding initiative. This money is sent to schools based on the numbers of children who are either eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) or are Looked After Children (LAC). From 2012/13 it has been expanded to include all children who have been eligible for FSM within the last 6 years. The Pupil Premium funding that is received by the school annually is used in a variety of ways in order to improve pupil attainment and to help overcome any barriers to learning.

Impact of PPG spending 2012/13

How do FSM or LAC pupils do at Norton Juxta Kempsey CE First School?

Pupils for whom the school receives the pupil premium make at least good progress. It is as good as other pupils in the school and compares favourably with the national average. The funding to support these pupils has been used effectively to provide support to improve attendance and extra periods of coaching. As a result, the gap between these pupils' attainment and others in the school is closing in both English and mathematics-Ofsted 2013.
